Stage 2 Improv opens today in Naples

Anything can, and will, happen during shows at Sugden

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ometimes you'll be a finalist in something called the Bathtub-Scrubbing Olympics.

Sometimes you'll play a round of golf — not with a golf club, mind you, but with an

octopus.

Sometimes someone will squirt you in the face with a water bottle, casually dry his hands on a towel and then just leave you standing there – soaking.

That's what makes improv comedy so exciting, says comedian Synthia DuBose.

You never know just who you'll be or what you'll do when you step onto that stage.

"I don't know if I'm going to be a lobster tonight or a nun," says DuBose, 25, of Fort Myers.

So almost anything can happen this weekend when the brand-new Stage 2 Improv takes the stage at Sugden Theatre in downtown Naples.

That's the point, after all.
"You don't have a script, so
you never know what you're
going to get," says Judith Gangi Santos, 43, who co-founded
Stage 2 with husband Mike
Santos. "It's like Forrest

Gump."

Stage 2 rose out of the former Naples City Improv, which performed in Naples from 2008 to 2012. The new group gets its name from its new home, the secondary Tobye Studio stage in Sugden Thea-

tre.

Former Naples City Improvements Judith and Mike Santos had been thinking about starting a new improvement. And that's when The Naples Players broached the subject.

"They asked us if we wanted to do a show," says Mike Santos, 31, who works as technical director for The Naples Players "And we said, absolutely! We were already thinking of putting a company together!"

Now, two months and one casting call later, the 12 members of Stage 2 Improv are performing for three weeks in the Tobye Studio. Each show features a rotating cast of five or six performers.

If you've never seen improv comedy, just think about the hit TV show "Whose Line Is It Anyway?" with comedian Drew Carey. The cast performs short scenes, skits, songs and comedy games – all based on audience suggestions. The better the audience, the better the show.

"All of what we do is made up on the spot, onstage," Mike Santos says. "Without an audience, we can't do much. Well, we could. But it wouldn't be very interesting!"
